# Pastor's Perspective



A prayer for back to school: Dear God.

We find ourselves once more asking "Where did the summer go?"

Parents chase down those last hard-to-find supplies on the list, take inventory of the children's closets in vain hope that something from last spring might still fit, and otherwise busy themselves as resistance to the reality that the kids are another year closer to launch.

Meanwhile, other parents shop for bedspreads and mini fridges alongside their grown-but-not-quite child, navigating the delicate balance of the shifting parent-child dynamic. One minute she's so sure of herself. The next, a roommate hiccup has her coming undone. And Mom and Dad wonder if it's time to step in or stand back and let her work it through herself. (These parents start to long for the days when they couldn't keep the kids in tennis shoes.)

But then she does it.

She sorts it out all on her own.

She is proud, and so are they.

Grandparents wait for pictures from back-to-school night or campus drop off. They reflect on years gone by, pulling out photo albums from times when pictures were not so easily snapped and shared across the country.

What is this feeling: Melancholy? Relief? Gratitude?

God, for each (grand)parent we pray. Give them strength, patience, and wisdom for a new school year.

Teachers set up classrooms and sort supplies. They attend trainings and meetings (and more meetings!). They send letters to their students welcoming them to a new learning community. They make wish lists on

Amazon, and they make dollars stretch, spending more of their own than they'll admit. They wrestle with technology—Blackboard, Class Dojo, whatever's the "next new thing".

They review the class list. They've heard rumors about one student—"He'll give you a run for your money." (They secretly think, "I bet I can handle him!"). Suddenly, déjà vu! "Wait, I had her father in class!" The years go by so fast.

Other teachers feel the shift in the atmosphere—"It's back to school time!" But they are retired now. They have served their community and their students. Look at what a difference they have made! These teachers don't set alarms or review lesson plans. What is this feeling: Melancholy? Relief? Gratitude?

God, for each teacher we pray. Give them strength, patience, and wisdom for a new school year.

Some children choose first-day-of-school outfits and the right fit from Shoe Carnival. They count out glue sticks and place them in the cart.

Other children aren't shopping for new. They count on a trip to Hangers and wait with Mom and Dad in line at back-to-school giveaways hoping to get what they need.

Some children are excited to see their friends, while other children fear another school year of not fitting in.

Some children lament, "I don't want summer to end!" Others excitedly return, because they know at school they will be safe and fed and loved.

Other students aren't children anymore. They are taking their first steps into adulthood, anxious to prove themselves, but also anxious about all the changes.

What is this feeling? Fear? Courage? Growth?

God, for each student we pray. Give them strength, patience, and wisdom for a new school year.

Lord, bless this coming school year. Keep our classrooms safe and help us all to grow.

Teach children and youth the value of giving.


Encourage thoughtful decision-making around charitable giving.


Foster community, compassion, and leadership in our young people.

## A Note from The Green Team

"It isn't easy being green."

- Kermit's Song, Sesame Street

We are a diverse congregation with lots of different ideas. That's good. Even better is knowing what unifies us. One of our values is that we are to be stewards of the earth that God has created and entrusted to us. It is in that spirit that the Green Team shares the effects on climate-related tax provisions in the recently passed One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA).

- Effective September 30<sup>th</sup>, the consumer tax credit of up to \$7,500 for new electric cars and \$4,000 for used cars is eliminated.
- All funds from the 2022 IRA (Inflation Reduction Act) for communities to increase energy efficiency and climate resiliency are being eliminated.
- Instead of 9 years from now (2034 under the IRA), the residential tax credit of 30% for solar, batteries, insulation, energy efficient windows, geothermal heat pumps, high efficiency heating and cooling systems, and similar items is eliminated on December 31 of this year.
- The Direct Pay option for nonprofits and governmental entities to get an equivalent benefit to a tax credit will be affected by the cutting of various clean energy tax credits.
- It repeals the increase in royalty rates the government receives for oil and gas leases on federal lands from 16.6% to 12.5% and on coal leases from 12.5% to 7%, reducing taxpayer funds and increasing profits for oil, gas and coal companies.
- It reinstates fossil fuel lease sales in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and gives the majority of the royalties to the State of Alaska instead of all American taxpayers.



The Stewardship Team looks forward to kicking off our campaign this month, and as part of that, we'd like to share with you some statistics that we found informative about the patterns of financial giving at Bethlehem. There are a lot of numbers included here, but we want to draw your attention to a couple of items:

First, we are a generous church and our combined efforts fund Bethlehem's vital ministries. 241 Giving Units contributed almost \$460,000 in 2024. Thank you for this support!

Second, there is a disparity between the giving units and the pledging units. It is one of the goals of the Stewardship Team to help move those 162 unpledged units to pledged units. Pledging helps our budget team make responsible decisions around how to allocate resources for effective ministry. We will be talking more about how to pledge over the next couple of months.

Third, fewer than fifty percent of our giving units utilize online giving. We know that many prefer to give in more traditional ways (and that's fine!), but for those who would like to learn more about online giving or simply need help figuring out how to set it up, we want to make available the opportunity to make giving automatic for those interested.

Stay tuned for more information from the Stewardship Team in the days ahead, and mark your calendars now for October 4-5, which will be our Consecration Weekend.

United Caring Services strives to create a welcoming and safe environment for individuals experiencing homelessness. With 98 windows that urgently need to be replaced due to extreme deterioration (3 have recently fallen to the ground from the 3rd and 4th floors), your support will not only enhance the facility, but also provide a safer, brighter, more uplifting atmosphere for its guests.



Each replacement window costs \$500. Currently, sponsorship has been obtained for 60 of the 98 windows that need to be replaced, with 38 more needed to complete the project. Bethlehem members and groups have already provided funding for **11 windows!** 

The Outreach Team would like to challenge individuals, groups of friends, and church groups to bring Bethlehem's total to **20 window sponsorships**.
