## Pastor's Perspective



Some yearly traditions, if they were proposed today, would probably not pass the safety and/or common-sense test. For example, out of both safety and logistical concerns, we probably wouldn't invent Trick-or-Treating in 2024 (and, in fact, its popularity has waned over the last decade or so as "trunk or treats" have become more popular). Additionally, if it were not already part of our country's Independence Day traditions, we probably would not advocate allowing untrained people to possess and deploy fireworks (not to mention the question of sobriety while doing so!).

Likewise, I'm convinced that if it were not an already entrenched and beloved part of our Christmas tradition, we would not think it a good idea to tightly pack people into a pew, give everyone (regardless of age) an individual candle, and pass the fire around the dark sanctuary. (So, I give thanks for whomever started it long ago, because it is truly a highlight of the season!)

We take certain risks for the sake of our traditions, risks we don't often evaluate. It's just what we do!

On Christmas Eve we will gather again in the sanctuary and end the service with our candles raised singing "Silent Night." We will turn off the lights, but it will not be dark. Darkness cannot overcome even the smallest flame.

And we will think of that tiny flame ignited in Bethlehem all those many years ago. Its glow was enough to prompt angels to break into song, to cause shepherds to rejoice, and to give Mary pause ("and Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart").

While we sing, we will marvel at the growing glow from our candles as the light makes its way from the Christ candle to the very last pew. The Incarnation is that first flicker of light that breaks through, but its light grows like the candles in the sanctuary on Christmas Eve. We are meant to pick up that light and add to its radiance in the world.

We forget that everyone holding a candle while distracted by the song they're supposed to be singing comes with certain risks, because we've done it for decades.

Likewise, we may forget that bearing Christ's light in the world also comes with risk (because many of us have also done this for decades!).

Which leads us to one more thing we might forget: this all cost God, too. That first flicker in Bethlehem was the greatest risk God ever undertook (with the possible exception of creating the world in the first place!). The Incarnation cost God. God coming to us in Jesus came with a cost. We should not be surprised that following Jesus asks something of us, too.

Be careful as you hold your candle on Christmas Eve. We take the fire risk, because it's worth the reward of the beautiful candle-lit sanctuary. Let us also take care as we follow Jesus in discipleship. It is also a risk worth taking, because we believe in the Kingdom He brings in our midst! Thanks be to God!

In 2016 the U.S. joined with 192 other countries in signing the Paris Climate Agreement with the aim of having a stronger response to the dangers of climate change. All countries agreed to a preferred goal of holding the increase in average worldwide temperature to 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels (2.7 degrees Fahrenheit). However, the Agreement lacks any meaningful enforcement mechanism. The U.S. pulled out in 2018 and re-joined in 2021. It looks like we will pull out again.

Historically, the U.S. is by far the largest contributor to greenhouse gas emissions at 20%. China 2nd at 11%. Russia 3rd at 7%.

Currently, China is the largest contributor with the U.S. second and India third. Combined, the three account for 42.9% of current emissions.

We are likely to consistently pass the 1.5 degree goal by the end of this decade absent meaningful changes by those who are contributing the most. We are on our way to the second year in a row of having the hottest year on record (likely hitting the 1.5 C. mark this year). We will also pass several tipping points soon after (think melting ice packs, thawing of the frozen tundra, etc.), which will accelerate further global warming of the air and oceans, and cause disruptive climate changes.

Estimates vary upon how much higher we might go by the end of the century. Reliable sources range from 2.6 to 3.1 degrees C. Adverse effects will happen exponentially above 2.0 C.

While going over the goal will not doom the earth and all life on it, it will have dire consequences for billions of people and animal, plant and marine species.

### Among the consequences:

significant new areas of frequent and long-lasting drought (estimate of 75% of world's population affected by 2050)

mass migration to less affected areas

increased strength and frequency of severe storms

coral reefs will die out and many fish will lose their habitat

sea levels will rise and coastal cities and towns will frequently flood absent expensive efforts to mitigate

forest and grassland fires will become more frequent

insurance rates will skyrocket

polar ice melting will accelerate

smaller and poorer countries will bear the brunt of change due to inability to afford adaptation and coping mechanisms

farmland will be subject to weather changes disrupting the ability to feed the world

It is easy to despair and become discouraged in the current environment. It is natural. However, we cannot give in. It is important to continue to do our individual and collective part. We can reduce our waste stream and carbon footprint. We can hold out hope that people will come to realize the seriousness of the situation for our future and apply pressure on business and government. We can hope that new technologies will develop to help in some way to reduce the amount of greenhouse gasses and their effects. We can support organizations that are fighting for climate justice.

The Advent season comes and goes quickly, and soon it will be time for Dehanging of the Greens. All ages are welcome on January 5, 2025 following worship to help tidy up the sanctuary after the holidays.
