Pastor's Perspective



I recently preached on the miraculous catch of fish from Luke 5. When I prepare a sermon, there are many different ways the message could go, but at some point I must choose a lane, which means there's often plenty of "good stuff" left on the cutting room floor. This time, something that didn't "make the cut" has really stuck with me.

You'll remember that in this story, Jesus instructs Peter to let down his nets in deep water, even though Peter and his crew (experienced fishermen!) had fished *all night long* and caught nothing. Think about that for a moment. A full workday (worknight?) and absolutely nothing was accomplished. Have you ever had one of these days at your work? Where you get to the end of it and you're like, "How did I really get nothing done today?" We can imagine how frustrated Peter must have been.

But when he follows Jesus' direction, suddenly his work becomes incredibly lucrative and worthwhile.

I am struck that the soon-to-be-disciples (though they don't know it yet!) fished and fished and fished and caught nothing. They were well-trained and hardworking. But they caught nothing.

Likewise, we can keep ourselves very busy doing all kinds of work without ever actually accomplishing what benefits God's Kingdom. It's a terrifying thought! Being busy is not a sign that we are doing the things that bear fruit in God's economy. It is not until we listen to the instructions of Jesus that we channel our energies (our "busy-ness") and our efforts result in a meaningful "catch."

Jesus' instructions are all over the Gospels: love your enemies, sell your possessions and give to the poor, love your neighbor as yourself, whatever you do unto the least of these. . ., not to mention the lessons gleaned from his many parables.

This is not easy stuff to be busy with! But it is the "deep water" Jesus calls us to.

Jesus invites Peter and company to no longer fish for fish, but to fish for people. And they leave that miraculous catch right there on the shoreline. What I am spending a lot of time thinking about these days (and especially as we approach the Lenten season) is whether or not I am busy with the right things. Is the church busy with the right things? And if we are not, are we prepared/willing to put out in the "deep water" and pursue those things that are closest to the heart of Jesus?

Are we willing to trade the "busy-ness" that may come most easily to us for the slow, difficult work of following the one who, just a chapter before this miraculous catch of fish, proclaimed his mission statement in the synagogue?

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed,
19 to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."



Marvin was born and raised in Evansville, graduating from Reitz High School in 1956 where he was a member of the football and tennis teams. He attended Purdue University and majored in agriculture, which is a testament to his passion for the outdoors. For his entire career, Marvin was always associated with the agricultural industry. Whether

helping farms or golf courses, Marvin had an enthusiasm to improve the quality of their operations through chemical products and fertilizers. He started his career with McCarty Seed Co and eventually worked as Vice President of Seedkem Inc, where he made an everlasting mark on his customers. As a natural outdoorsman, Marvin found great joy in hunting, whether goose at Hovey Lake on New Year's Day or duck on the Ohio River. He was also known to be quite the gardener with a penchant for raising large vegetables and his delicious sweet corn at the family farm on Hitch and Peters Road in Evansville.

Mostly, Marvin will be remembered as a kind soul with a sense of humor and deep love for his dogs. With a big heart, he was always looking for the good in any person he met in life and extended that sentiment through his involvement in the community. Marvin was active in many organizations, including lvy Tech, Masonic Lodge, and the Hadi Shriners. Notably, he and his wife were nominated by the American Red Cross for founding the military support group "United We Stand" for the families and service members of the Gulf War.

Marvin is survived by daughters, Cindy (Marc) Fine of Evansville, IN and Lisa O'Hair of Carmel, IN; son, Eric (Dianne) Peter of Indianapolis; grandchildren, Joel (Jordan) Fine, Jessica (Logan) Bitter, Jacob O'Hair and Grace (John) Delaney; and great-grandchildren, Isabelle Bitter, Bo Bitter, Eloise Fine, Jacob Fine, Avery Delaney, and Caroline Delaney. continued Marvin was preceded in death by his wife of 64 years, Margaret "Ann" Peter, his parents, and son-in-law, David O'Hair.
