
**SERIES OVERVIEW:** Can you imagine if Esther

## Stewardship Update

Our financial gifts make ministry and mission possible at Bethlehem. In September, we heard stories on the church's impact on the lives of our members, friends, community, and beyond.

As the church's fiscal year comes to an end, one responsibility of the Finance Ministry Team and Church Council is to carefully review the current year's budget and standings, to investigate the potential needs of the church for the following year, and to set the 2026 budget prayerfully and thoughtfully.

The graphic on the following page helps us understand our expenses at Bethlehem, dividing our budget into four categories: Benevolence, Worship, Education, and Fellowship. Every dollar spent at Bethlehem is crucial to our church's mission and well-being.

In September, a stewardship letter and pledge card were mailed to the wider church family inviting you to support our mission into 2026 through pledging.

On October 4 & 5, we invite you to prayerfully consider the amount to pledge for 2026 and place the card in the offering plate during worship. Additional pledge cards are available in the Welcoming Area, narthex, office-entrance vestibule, and outside the church office.

Everything that happens at Bethlehem is ministry, and your pledge enables us to continue this mission in 2026 and for years to come.

### **Budget Breakdown**

Do you ever wonder how your tithes and offerings are being put to use for the Bethlehem United Church of Christ congregation and the wider community? Below, we break down each pledged dollar into four categories:

Benevolence, Worship, Fellowship, and Education



## BENEVOLENCE 23%

Twenty-three percent of the budget is spent on benevolence, or doing good for others. This includes money we give directly to organizations we support, like Back Bay Mission and United Caring Services. This percentage also accounts for the benevolence activities performed by Bethlehem staff members.



### EDUCATION 14%

Fourteen percent of the budget funds educational activities, including Confirmation and Adult, Youth, and Children's Ministries. This funding also accounts for the time that staff spend planning and engaging in these activities. Many educational activities are provided by volunteers, which helps keep spending low in this category.





Fifty-three percent of the budget funds worship services and congregational care. This includes music and technology support for worship services, and it also accounts for the staff time spent preparing and participating in worship services and providing pastoral care to the congregation.



## FELLOWSHIP 10%

Ten percent of the budget is used to fund fellowship opportunities for the congregation. In addition to funding church events, this category also includes activities like Campus Connection and Called to Care. Many fellowship events are planned by volunteers, which allows for spending in other areas.

## a note from medical professionals within our church family



Dear Members of Bethlehem UCC,

As we approach the flu season of 2025-2026, we wanted to reach out with a friendly reminder about the importance of getting your annual flu vaccination. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) suggests that the yearly flu shot is a really good way to help prevent the flu and its more serious complications.

For this upcoming season, the vaccines are trivalent, designed to protect against the most common flu strains and recommended for just about everyone 6 months of age and older, unless there's a specific medical reason not to. If you have more wisdom than 65 years, ask for the high-dose flu vaccines (like Fluzone High-Dose) or adjuvanted flu vaccines (like Fluad) because they create a stronger immune response.

You might also find it convenient that you can get both your updated flu vaccine and your COVID-19 vaccine at the same time this season. It's an easy

way to get protection against both respiratory illnesses. We encourage you to chat with your healthcare provider to figure out the best approach for you.

Let's all consider taking this opportunity to look after our health and show our care for one another. Getting vaccinated is a simple way we can contribute to the well-being and community spirit of Bethlehem UCC.


